Minnesota D.A.R.E. has been studied and updated several times since 1990. We are no longer just about drugs and alcohol, We are a children's organization. Our mission is to advocate and educate for the health and safety of our Minnesota children Our officers are the vehicle and it became apparent that the not only talked to the children about safety issues: they formed relationships with the children and their families. The officers learned about the people in their jurisdiction.

The curriculum changed over the years to encompass issues like violence, bullying/cyberbullying, Internet safety, social media, prescription and over the counter drugs, opiate abuse, vaping, school safety, mental health issues, high school topics. communication skills, friendship, and suicide prevention. The current version of the curriculum was written by Penn State and has been on the effective program list under the title "keepinIt REAL." The elementary curriculum just completed an evaluation by UNC Greensboro-Jan. 2022. The socio-emotional curriculum utilizes a decisionmaking model. Any issue facing the children, in their schools/neighborhoods, can be dropped into this model.

D.A.R.E. Officers become humanized to the students during 10 weeks with the students, being in the lunchroom, playing on the playground. The children can ask questions and are provided safety information (our tool) which starts conversations. The officers learn from the children and the officers now see them as individuals and friends. Through this relationship, we are able to address these above list of recommendations.

## Minnesota D.A.R.E. Welcomes 28 New D.A.R.E. Officers

Minnesota D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) certified 16 new D.A.R.E. officers from the  $50^{\text{th}}$  class and 12 from the  $51^{\text{st}}$  class trained in Minnesota. These officers recently completed their two weeks of training conducted by Minnesota D.A.R.E. and the Minnesota BCA

After a pause in training, due to Covid 19, Minnesota D.A.R.E. set up the two officer training courses to get current programs back up and expand to areas that lost their programming due to challenging times. These officers are trained in Pre-K –  $4^{th}$  Grade Pprogramming, Elementary programming, Middle School programming, High School programming, and our Enhancement Lessons – Vaping, Opiates and other Drugs, Suicide Prevention, Bullying/Cyberbullying, Gangs and Violence, Role Models, and soon to be released Social Media.

The D.A.R.E. Officer training is very intense and comprehensive. Officers must attend, participate, and pass classes, hosted by specially trained mentors under the direction of D.A.R.E. America. Officers are then given the D.A.R.E. curriculum at no charge and will continue to be supported in their teaching efforts by Minnesota D.A.R.E., Inc., the non-profit organization that administers the program for the state of Minnesota. These officers will be joining our currently certified officers, instructing approx. 60,000 students and their families annually.
